A catered dinner will be held at the Arlington Lakes Banquet Hall with dinner starting at 6:30 p.m. We will have a cash bar.

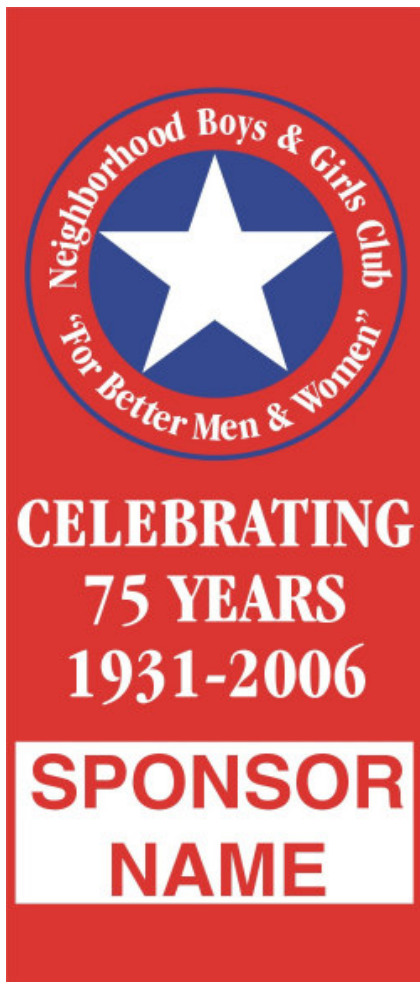

THIRTEEN EARN SCHOLARSHIPS

NBGC Leaders are eligible to earn college scholarships under a program initiated in 1984 by our Alumni Association. High School Leaders apply each year for a \$500 to \$1,000 tuition award, which is payable upon college registration. College-aged Leaders are eligible for awards ranging from \$2,000 to \$5,000 per year. Long-time service and dedication are required, as well as continued work at NBGC, for the college awards.

Leaders apply to the Scholarship Committee and are interviewed. The criteria includes their work performance during the prior year as well as a 250 word essay on their contribution to the Boys Club. The Selection Committee met with the 19 finalists recently and selected the 2005 recipients. WORDS OF WISDOM FROM FATHER RAYMOND BAUMHART

It was an honor to have Father Ray Baumhart (Bulldogs, Owls, 30's) as a special guest and keynote speaker at the Leaders of the Future Scholarship Luncheon on April 12th. His speech follows:

"On April 4th I had dinner with Robert Buehler, the founder of the Neighborhood Boys Club. The occasion was the celebration of his 102nd birthday. Mr. Buehler and his family provided the funding for the N.B.C. for many years. More importantly, Robert Buehler provided the fundamental idea that was to make the Club successful and unique: to teach values and character to boys through a year-round, well organized program of sports, recreational tournaments, and team meetings. It was also Mr. Buehler's idea to develop "leaders", boys with experience in the Club, who would referee and officiate the games and other activities of younger boys. And Bob Buehler made a perfect choice for director of N.B.C., Richard Valentin, a good athlete with a wide-ranging knowledge of sports and a desire to help boys. If we think of Mr. Buehler as the brains and wallet of N.B.C., Dick Valentin was the heart. Two wonderful, altruistic men-born educators-they became life-long friends of mine. They are among the 10 most influential persons in my life. Never forget these two giants who founded this great club.

Now to the body of my talk. My remarks will be aimed at the young people in the audience. My subject is leadership, a topic that is broad enough so that you adults may hear a thought or two worth remembering.

I grew up on Hamilton Avenue, near Irving Park, and attended nearby St. Benedict School. In the fall of 1934, a classmate, Dan Lydon, introduced me to the Neighborhood Boys Club. Its year-round program of team sports and individual recreational activities was a godsend to me. Recall that we had no television, no computers, no e-mail, no cell phones, and very little money-the United States was in a financial depression. Football, softball, basketball, baseball, and soccer games with good equipment, referees and regular schedules and at no cost, were an unbelievable boon to us. Our team, the Bulldogs, was composed of 11 and 12 year old boys from the neighborhood near St. Benedict and Coonley schools. We were part of a league with teams of 11 and 12- year-olds from other neighborhoods, roughly speaking, from Damen on the east to Kedzie on the west and from Roscoe on the south to Wilson on the north. I was at Paul Revere Park at least five days a week. I learned how to play table tennis and chess, learned how to compete in all sports boys played then. It was a wonderful

time.

About two years later I was appointed a leader. My first duties were working in the clubhouse, an old three-story single-family house that was long ago replaced by today's clubhouse. Then I became a score-keeper at games between the younger boys, and then a referee or umpire at those games. I became knowledgeable about the rules for most sports. Among the skills I developed as a leader were writing and editing, and eventually driving a bus. The Club had a weekly one-page paper, The Monkeyshines. I began by reporting on the games and tournaments. In time I edited the paper, typed the master copy, and mimeographed 500 copies each week.

When I was 16 the N.B.C. opened a program at Hanson Park located at Fullerton and Central avenues. I was the senior leader there for a year. Later, when I was a freshman at DePaul University, I was Dick Valentin's assistant at Paul Revere Park.

Along came World War II. With Robert Buehler's mentoring I entered a Navy Officers Training Program. I went off to military service after 8 1/2 years of association with N.B.C., first as a player, then as a player and leader, and finally as a leader. My brothers, Jerry and Jim, followed me as participants in the Club-both as players and leaders.

Now for some thoughts about leadership, some from my time as a leader at N.B.C., some from my experience as a Navy officer, some from my studies at the Harvard Business School, some from my experience as a faculty member, dean and president at Loyola University.

For much of the world's business and affairs to be done, leaders are required. Another university president helped me to think of leadership as a relationship among four variables: the leader, the followers, their organization, and the setting for the organization. The leader and the followers must be compatible, must be in sync. The setting in the case of NBGC, Paul Revere Park, the surrounding neighborhoods, and their social, economic, political and religious organizations must be considered in decisions and actions.

The personal traits needed for a leader to be effective in a given situation vary with the other three variables. For instance, the qualities desirable in a choir director are different from those needed by the principal of a high school.

And the traits needed by teachers in a multicultural, inner-city school are different from those needed by teachers in an affluent, English-speaking suburban school. Perhaps we should not speak of persons being good or bad leaders, but of a person who is an effective leader in certain situations, and ineffective in others.

Leadership being a relationship between a person and a situation, it follows that one leadership style or personality is not effective in all situations. So, effective leadership is not dependent on a person's possessing a single universal pattern of talents and traits. There is no check-off list of qualities every leader possesses.

Let's take a look at a question that has probably occurred to you: what kind of personality traits and behavior often make a person an effective leader? Social psychologists who have researched this question say that persons who become leaders tend to be more intelligent, more assertive, and more talkative than other members of their group. Underlying those characteristics is self-confidence. Self confidence is important because a leader must have enough faith in himself or herself to act on probabilities, not only on certainties. And a leader cannot constantly be looking for approval; rather he or she should be thinking about the well-being of others, about the common good. My opportunities as a leader at N.B.C. were very important in building my self-confidence.

There is no substitute for knowledge, and formal education is the ordinary avenue to knowledge. Probably the trait that most frequently distinguishes the leader from coworkers is that he/she knows more about the group task than anyone, or can do it better. The foreman of a machine shop is likely to be a better machinist than his co-workers.

The leader must also be able to select capable coworkers and develop them. The good leader can get people to work for him/her when they are under no obligation to do so.

And the leader should have vision. To me that means the ability to understand the organization as a whole, to understand its purpose in all its complexity, and to look ahead to see what will be needed to move the organization to achieve its purpose in a changing world.

If you are looking for a definition of leadership, here's one I like: the ability to exert a positive influence on those around you in an effort to make things happen that are important to

you and to them.

One final point I want to make with you young men and women. My personal history, of which you have just heard, should persuade you that you can do more with your life than you thought you could, that you can be better and more productive than you think. Please note that I am not saying that you can be anything you want to be, can accomplish anything you want to do. I hear some of these so-called motivational speakers making statements like that. They are exaggerating. I never could and never will be able to dunk a basketball.

What I am saying is that your experience in the N.B.G.C. is more valuable than you realize. That you should set realistic goals for yourself, each a little higher than the last one. Learn about yourself from each new experience and adventure. Being a leader at Paul Revere Park is a very good start for living a successful and helpful life."
