#### TIGERS ARE TEAM CENTER 4 CHAMPS

The Tigers won the championship in Team Center 4 League as they won 14 out of 15 games. The secret of their success was excellent pitching and catching with Tom Stiglic and Terry Safko alternating at the positions. As a team they batted 292 and the individuals who led the team were Safko with .500, Stiglic with .474 and Dorner .471. The team was also tops in waiting out the opposing pitchers as 135 men got on base via walks. This almost doubled that of the other teams. They played well together all season, had good spirit and deserved to win.

#### HORNETS WIN IN T.C. 5

The Hornets took the title in their league by winning 13 out of 15 games. The competition was close all the way as the Spiders pressed them until the final week of the season and then finished only one game behind with a 12 & 3 record. # FLICKER BALL RULES The following are the rules for the next sport which all leagues will play. Read them over

very carefully.

- 1. Length of Came: Two 16-minute halves set up in this manner. 8-minute quarters, 3 minutes between quarters and 8 minutes between halves. Total time of game about one hour.
- 2. Number of players: Full team 11 men, how-ever a team may play with 8 men.
- 3. Substitutions: Each boy must play at least one quarter; substitute for injury any time; free substitution of players during official time out, after goal or attempted goal, if ball goes out of bounds, or when ball is dead. No substitution may be made for a player in the possible her. the penalty box.
- 4. Putting the ball in play: A coin flip at the beginning of the game gives the winner choice of putting the ball into play or defending a certain goal. The loser gets the same choice at the 2nd half. To start the game, at half time, after a score or unsuccessful try or when the ball travels into or beyond the or when the ball travels into or beyond the end zone, the ball is put into play by a player standing behind the inside end zone line. A ball which goes out of bounds between the two inside end zone lines is put into play at the spot it leaves the field. A team in control of the ball at the quarter puts the ball into play from the center line off side at the beginning of the next quarter. If there is an overtime period a coin toss determines who takes the ball out from the front end zone line. If there is a sudden death over time the ball is put into play by the controling team from the center off sides line.
- 5. Ball in Play: A team retains possession of the ball if it completes consecutive forward, lateral or backward passes leading to a scoring attempt. The passer must not hold the ball longer than 20 seconds. He may run laterally or backward from the point he gains control of the ball. He may either forward pass the ball or lateral it. A pass receiver or interceptor may take only 3 steps forward after gaining control of the ball. A violation of these rules gives the defenders possession of the ball at the point of the violation. The defending team gains possession of the ball after each incomplete pass by downing the ball. If the ball goes out of bounds the team last touching it loses possession of it at that point where it leaves the field. (cont'd. on page 4)

It is put into play where it leaves the field.
If the defending team does not down the ball it
is put into play at the point where it rolls to
a stop. The team which attempted the incomplete
pass must say away from it.
A team may gain control by intercepting a pass
in flight. A batted down or partial blocked
ball that does not hit the ground is in play.
A batted down ball or fumble intercepted is a
free ball. A batted down ball that goes into
the end zone on a scoring attempt is the defense
ball as is one which hits the football goal
Post. Any ball which hits the football goal
post first is a dead ball.
6. Fouls & Penalties. You servet mess the foot-

6. Fouls & Penalties: You cannot pass the football into the far court unless you have a receiver in there. This plus intentional grounding of the ball gives the ball to the defense at the point of the foul.

Kicking, punching or slapping a loose ground ball has the same penalty.

If two men both have partial possession of the ball it goes to the defender.

Any form of body contact such as pass interference by the defense or offense, roughing the passer, olipping, tripping, charging by the passer while moving laterally or backward results in a free shot from the end zone line by the fouled and removal from the game until the next regulation score by the team who fouled.

Any unsportsmanlike conduct can result in the expulsion from the game and a technical foul free shot.

7. Players Equipment: Players may wear gyms or regulation football shoes. Baseball spikes are not permitted.

8. Tie Games: Games ending in a tie are played to a final score by two overtime periods. The first is a 4-minute period. A coin flip decides who get the ball first. If a second one is necessary there is a 2-minute wait and then another 4-minute sudden death period. The team in control of the ball at the end of the first period brings it into play from the center offside line.

9. The ball is dead after a score or scoring attempt, after a foul, after an incomplete pass, when it leaves the field, during time outs, if it enters the far court before a receiver is there, if it hits the goal post or rolls into the end zone.

An incomplete pass not touched by the defense cannot be recovered by the offense or passing
