CADET FALCONS KICK WAY PAST LOCUSTS




The Cadets tuned up for the regular season wi their second soccer game last Friday, and the Falcons edged the Locusts 1-0 on a second half



tried their best in the 4th, but were again held.






The Prep Falcons closed out the pre-snason with a win in a high-scoring game last Thursday, beating the Pirates 18-15.

Another good drill we worked on was a ball control drill in which the players had to dribble up to and circle a cone, and ended with a chest trapping drill. The ball would be tossed toward a player who would then use his chest to trap the in-flight pass. I would like to thank Mr. Samardzija for coming out and helping with the practice. He proved to be very valuable in showing us some appropriate drills. During the baseball practice we started with

two lines of players playing catch from a short distance, and then moving back a little as they went along. The proper throwing motion was stressed, along with the holding of the glove when catching bigh and low throws with both hands. The players also practiced on tossing grounders to each other while learning the proper fielding position, getting low to the ground and in front of the ball, and coming up with a solid and accurate throw. We will keep working on more fielding techniques each week, so bring your mitt along!

SOFTBALL RULES YOU SHOULD KNOW

PLAYING FIELD - The teams will play with a 55 foot baselength and a 39 foot pitching distance. Home plate, first and third bases, and the foul lines are fair ground.

BATTER'S BOX - There is no defined batter's box, but you are out if you step on, in front of, or behind the plate when you contact and hit a fair or foul ball. This applies to initial contact, not the follow through after contact.

THE BAT - The bat must have a safety grip of at least 10 inches and not more than 15 inches extending from the knob. The grip must be non-slippery, so no electrical or masking tape.

SPIKES - Only shoes with non-metal spikes are legal. There must not be any exposed metal on the bottoms.

PLAYERS AND SUBS - A full team has 10 players, and you must have at least 8 players to start a game. Forfeit time is 15 minutes after the scheduled game time. Call or pick up your teammates on the way and you won't forfeit!

PUTTING SUBS IN — Every player present and in uniform who is not late and does not have a poor attendance record must play half of the game. In the Prep League, a continuous batting order will be used, with subs taking to the field in the fourth inning. In the Tribe League, all subs go into the game in the 4th inning. Subs of the team with the outs enter in the top of the 4th, and subs of the team with the ins enter in the bottom of the 4th. If the bottom of the 4th is not reached with 25 minutes left in the game, they must enter after the current half inning. Captains should be fair and sub everyone once in a while, and try to play everyone a full game once in a while. Players who are late, miss too many games, or do not come out to practice should be subbed.

PINCH RUNNERS - A pinch runner may only be used if a batter reaches base safely and is injured on the play as long as the ump feels it is needed. If a player will need a pinch runner every at bat, he must be removed.

INS AND OUTS - This is decided by a coin flip 5 minutes before the scheduled start of the game. If both teams are full, or if both are short, a flip is held. If one is short, however, and the other is full, the full team gets the outs.

COMPLETE GAME - A complete game is 7 innings, and an official game is 4 innings. Extra innings are played if there is a tie. No new inning may start 10 minutes before the scheduled end of the game.

SLAUGHTER RULE - There is a 6 run per inning slaughter rule, except during each team's last at bats. The ball does not become dead as soon as the 6th run crosses the plate, but when the ball is mounded or the runners are held to a base. It is possible to score up to 9 runs in an inning. If a team is losing by 15 or more runs at any time after 5 at bats, the game is over.

FORFEITING A GAME - The game may be forfeited if a team refuses to continue play, acts in an unsportsmanlike manner, purposely delays the game, or purposely violates the rules.

<u>REGULATIONS</u> - The pitcher must begin with at least one foot on the rubber, facing the batter, with the ball held in one or both hands in front of the body. A foot must stay in contact with the rubber and cannot be taken off until releasing the ball.

WARM UPS - A pitcher is allowed 5 quick warm ups at the start of each inning, as does a relief pitcher who comes in for his first appearance. A pitcher who comes on in relief a second time gets one warm up.

THE FITCH AND DELIVERY - The pitch begins when the pitcher makes any motion that is part of his windup. He may step forward as he pitches, keeping his back foot on the rubber. but may not step backward or to the side. Spinning is local. The ball must be delivered underhand or sidearm, but not overhand. It must be thrown with an arc at a moderate speed, as judged by the umpire. A fast pitch or one without an arc is an automatic ball unless swung at.

HESITATIONS - A hesitation is a deceptive move by the pitcher in faking a pitch or pick off. Two hesitations are allowed. but the next move must either be a completed pitch or pick off throw.

NO PITCH - This is called when the pitcher throws a quite pitch before the batter is ready; pitches when time is cut or before the ump is ready; when the ball falls from the pitcher's hand during the backswing; or when the batting to says or does anything to cause an illegal pitch. A flagrant act causes ejection.

PITCHING CHANGES - If a team changes pitchers too often or to delay the game, they will not be able to make anymore changes.

BATTING - The batter is out for using an illegal bat. Once the pitcher is ready, the batter cannot step to the other side of the plate. The batter shall not hinder the catcher by stepping from the batter's box or interferring while still at the plate. The batter is out, and runners cannot advance. If it is on a play at the plate, runner is out.

Hembers of the batting team must stay back from the playing area unless an on deck batter. If you get too close to the field, your batter may be called out.

INFIELD FLY RULE - When runners are on 1st and 2nd or the bases are loaded, and when there are less than two outs. the batter is out if he hits a fair fly ball in the infield area that is judged an ordinary play for an infielder. The timners advance at their own risk. They must tag up if the ball is caught, but not if it is dropped or allowed to fall to the ground. The infield fly does not have to be for the batter to be out, need not be caught by an infielder, and may be slightly on the outfield grass.

STRIKE ZONE - This is the space over home plate between the batter's highest shoulder and bottoms of his kness when in his natural batting stance. Altering your stance does not change your strike zone. A pitch is judged by its position as it passes home plate, not the batter! A pitch that hits the plate or does not clear the tip is a ball.

BATTER IS OUT - It is an out to bunt or choo the ball fair or foul, and to throw your bat wildly after hitting the ball. Take a level swing, and learn to drop the bat straight down or carry it a couple of steps before dropping it foul. Never let go of the bat as you hit the ball, or scheme could get injured!

BASERUNNING - If a runner leaves a base too soon on a fly ball or misses a base, he is out if the ump sees it. If not, the defense must appeal. Appeals must be made before the next pitch, and only one appeal can be made on any one

Play is stopped when a runner passes a runner in front of him who is not yet out, and the passer is called cut. If a fair hit ball hits a runner before an infielder plays on or touches the ball, the runner is out. When an infielder obstructs a runner, the runner gets at least one base, as do any other runners affected. The ump awards as many bases as he feels would have been advanced without the obstruction.

Runners get two bases from the one last touched at the time a wild throw which goes out of bounds is released. There are no lead offs - stay on your base until the ball reaches the plate and is hit! There is no stealing at my time! Runners who steal illegally must get back before being tagged out.

Charge - To use any part of the upper shoulder to contact an opponent.

Clear - To move the ball away from your own goal.

Corner Kick - A direct free kick given to the offense at the corner of the field.

Defender - A player who stays back and protects the net, helps his goalie, and clears the ball toward his offensive temmates.

Direct Free Kick - A kick, after a foul, which can be shot into the net for a goal.

<u>Dribbling</u> - Advancing the ball by tapping it in a direction with the feet.

Free Kick - A kick awarded after a team commits a It can be either a direct or indirect kick.

Forward - An offensive player whose job it is to score and set up the offense.

Goalkeeper - He is the only player who can use his hands and arms to stop the ball. He can only do this, however, when in the goal area.

Goal Kick - An indirect kick by the defense after the ball goes out of play over the goal line.

Hand Ball - Intentionally touching the ball with the hands or arms.

Indirect Free Kick - A place kick which cannot go directly into the net for a goal. A player other than the kicker must touch it first for a goal to

Midflelder - A player who covers the area between the defenders and the forwards. He usually covers the most ground.

Obstruct - To block an opponent's path.

Pass - Something done by a team player who is always looking for a teammate in a better position for a

Slide Tackle - Taking the ball away from another player by sliding to the ground.

Striker - Position of the center.

Tackling - Taking the ball away by sliding or kicking

Trapping - Stopping the ball with the feet, thighs, the chest so that it drops to the ground for you

Throw In - A method of putting the bal into play after it goes out over the sideline.

LOCK YOUR BIKES OUTSIDE



- A full team is 8 players, and at least 6 are needed to start a game. Forfeit time is 15 minutes after the scheduled game time.
- All players must wear their team shirt with the correct number ironed on the back.
- 3. A game is played in two 20 minute halves. 4. A coin flip decides the opening drop ball when both teams are full or when both are short. When one team is full and one is short, the full team gets the drop ball. Defenders must be 10 yards away until the ball is kicked.

A goal is scored when the entire ball enters

the net and crosses the goalline.

6. An offensive is offside when he is nearer the goalline than the ball unless at least two defenders are nearer to the goal than he is. Offside is called if the referee believes the player who is offside is interfering with an opponent, seeking to gain an advantage. A player shall not be called for offside if he receives a goal kick, corner kick, or throw in.

7. A player who intentionally attempts to or actually kicks, trips, charges into violently, jumps at, charges into from behind, strikes, holds,

pushes an opponent, or intentionally handles the ball is penalized by a direct free kick. If any of these offenses occur within the goal area, a penalty kick is given. Less flagrant violations such as offside or obstruction are penalized by an indirect free kick.

8. On free kicks, the defenders must be at least 10 yards away from the ball until it is kicked.
A direct free kick can be kicked into the net and count as a goal. An indirect free kick must first be touched by a player other than the kicker before entering the net.

9. On a penalty kick, all players other than the

shooter and goalie must be at least 10 yards away from the ball and outside the goal area. 10. When the ball goes out of play, it is put back in play by a sideline throw in from the spot nearest to where is went out.

11. When the hall goes out across the goalline last touched by the offense, the defenders put the ball into play by a kick from the goal area.

12. When the ball crosses the goalline and goes out last touched by the defense, it is put back in play by a kick from the corner nearest where the ball

went out.




