JAMES MARTIN IS KILLED IN SERVICE James Martin, a former member and leader of N. B.C. was killed in the Service of our Country on February 26th while flying a Jet fighter plane over the Pacific near Hawaii.

Jim enlisted in the Marine Corps in the fall of 1951. While serving in the infantry in the Korean war he was wounded in action three times Korean war he was wounded in action three times the following year. After that he was sent home for a rest and then later on was given the opportunity to become an air cadet. He succeeded very rapidly and was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Marine Air Force. Later he worked in rescue operations flying a helicopter and about 18 months ago became a Jet pilot. He was a first lieutenant at the time of his death and was in line for a captain's rating this spring. was in line for a captain's rating this spring.

Jim was always very proud of the ring which he received from the Club as a token for earning the White Star For Better Men award. He visited the Club regularly and at one time attended all the meetings of the week telling the boys of his flying experiences.
